**APPEALS** - Concurrent findings - Supreme Court will not readily interfere - Where appellants did not attack any of the findings - Whether they will stand undisturbed. *Adigun v. The Governor of Osun State* P. 671

**CRIMINAL PROCEDURE** - Murder - Assignment of Counsel to the accused - From the Legal Aid Council - Whether properly done. *Nwambe v. The State* P. 619

**INTERIM INJUNCTIONS** - Difference between interim and interlocutory injunction - Whether both are the same. Seven-Up Ltd. v. Abiola & Sons Ltd. P. 647

**INTERLOCUTORY INJUNCTION** - Contempt of a subsisting court order - A party in contempt - Is not entitled to a favourable exercise of court's discretion. Lawal-Osula v. Lawal-Osula 601
